College is possible for students with intellectual disability! A wide range of colleges and universities, including research institutions, teaching colleges and universities, and community and technical colleges, have opened their doors to college students with intellectual disability (ID) by creating inclusive postsecondary education (IPSE) programs. These programs are highly valued as an active part of their campus communities and have a positive impact on administrators and leadership, faculty and staff, and college students, regardless of disability status. In this resource you will hear the perspectives of experienced higher education leaders who have developed IPSE programs and find some resources to help you explore developing or supporting an IPSE program on your campus.





## **DID YOU KNOW?**

College programs for students with **intellectual disability** are often called **IPSE programs.** In these programs, students take college courses related to their personal and career goals, pursue a course of study, and achieve one or more credentials. College students with ID are an active part of the campus community — learning, working, and often living with their college peers.


